Learning the Language



Meet Maggy, our Lodge Anchor at Makumu, who is our all-rounder and always willing to help wherever needed.

We asked Maggy about her home language and were fascinated to find out that she can speak SIX of South Africa's 11 official languages: IsiZulu, IsiXhosa, SiSwati, Xitsonga, Afrikaans and English, with her home language being SiSwati.

Maggy says that Swati teaches culture, morals and values, from childhood to adulthood. It is a language that is straight to the point and one that is spoken with dignity and respect. Swati teaches life skills, without the need for educating on it specifically, i.e. the do's and don't's of a language from birth to adulthood.

Many other African languages "borrow" words to make their own, however Swati has their own, original words for several things i.e. make (mother), umgwaco (road), emabokonya (water) and luswane (infant).

Maggy is extremely proud of her home language and culture and even has a typical Swati broom at the lodge, made from special grasses.

Wildlife Update



The wildlife has decided to take over while we are all in lockdown! Baboons and monkeys are visiting the lodge on a regular basis and the warthogs are starting to return to our wonderful garden at the lodge, with sightings of them now being common. We are also seeing many chameleons lately, during the day as well

as night, with up to 4 or 5 in one drive.

Even the leopards and hyenas are walking through the camp every second night. Unfortunately we don't see them but do spot their tracks the next morning!

When we are out on a game drive, elephants are seen in abundance. They have been more difficult to spot during the summer months and we were seldom treated to big breeding herds, however we are delighted that they have joined us on this side of the reserve again.

The wallows have now started drying up and there is little water in the drainage systems for the animals. We have therefore seen more movement around the prominent water sources which are now becoming busy with big game. We have had great hyena sightings and occasionally some fantastic lion sightings.
